Love Your Landscaping... What's Wrong with My Lawn?

Two of the most common types of grass for lawns in this area are St. Augustine and Bermuda. While both of these are hearty, each one can be susceptible to insects. But thankfully, there are ways to detect and combat the pesky critters and keep your lawn looking beautiful.

St. Augustine grass has grub worms and the chinch bug, which is about the size of a grain of rice, easily identifiable by the X on its back. If either of these attack, the sign will be the turf turning yellow then brown and thinning in blotches or circles that keep getting larger. The treatment for both is a granular insecticide that you apply like fertilizer.

Bermuda grass can be attacked by mites that are blackish orange and microscopic. A telltale sign that you have Bermuda grass mites can be seen in tufts of grass that look like a broom. To combat the mites, mow a little lower than normal and bag the clippings, then water and fertilize to outgrow the damage.
