#### **Bulk Trash Pickup Returns to Normal Allowances**

With residents sheltering at home over the past few months, Republic Services reported an average of 30% greater volume of trash to be picked up from homes. This includes both regular garbage and bulk trash. To accommodate the increase, Republic temporarily shifted duties of some of their drivers' routes and limited the amount of bulk trash per household for a short time.

Now, Rockwall residents will be happy to note, that Republic Services is back on their regular schedule for bulk trash pickup. That means the temporary restrictions on the number of cubic feet of bulk waste allowed per household has been lifted. They do ask that people still bag leaves and grass clippings and continue to put them out front with bulk trash. Republic has been working hard to meet the needs of the increased demand, which is expected to even out again in the coming months.

#### Stay Informed on Important Issues with Nixle

Right now, more than ever, there are important issues happening in Rockwall County, and residents need to stay informed. There's an emergency alert and preparedness app that can help. It's called Nixle, and when something happens and the public needs to know, including severe weather, the latest COVID-19 information, criminal activity or more, the Rockwall County Office of Emergency Management sends a text and/or email to alert subscribers. #### Love Your Landscape: Is it Time to Start Watering?

At this point, you should only have watered about one or two times since February, because the rainy weather so far this year has provided ample water for your lawn and landscapes. Generally around mid-May we start watering our landscapes and lawns, and it's important to water properly, not only to make our landscapes happy, but to conserve water as well. Whether you water with an automatic sprinkler system or with a water hose, the goal is to apply 1" of water per week. This is the perfect amount to keep your lawn and landscape plants happy and growing. Here are some tips to help with smarter watering:



- Turn off water if it's forecasted to rain; if it does not rain then you can water the next day
- Sprinkler systems generally use 2" of water per hour with spray heads and 1/2" of water per hour with large rotors
- Watering programs: 2 days per week, zone run times 15 minutes on sprays and 30 minutes on rotors
- Sunny areas may require more water and shaded areas may require less
- Inspect your system at least monthly to ensure proper operation
- One sprinkler head typically puts out 4 gallons of water per minute a broken sprinkler head can put out 20 gallons of water each minute!
- With a 15-minute run time, normal head = 60 gallons vs. broken head = 300 gallons
- Make sure sprinkler heads water lawn and landscape plants, not concrete, buildings and fences
- Most lawn and plant loss is caused by over-watering and not a lack of water
