

World War II Veteran and Rockwall Resident Chosen as Grand Marshal of Kiwanis Christmas Parade

This Rockwall veteran of World War II and Korea has been around the world and seen a lot in his nearly 97 ¹/₂ years... but soon he'll get to do something he's never done before—lead a parade, which brings a smile to his face. A.J. Dailey has been named the Grand Marshal of the Rockwall Kiwanis Christmas Parade coming up on Saturday, December 2.

He's a character for sure; Dailey loves telling tales, most of which are true, he promises. He's authored four books since turning 90, and is already working on ideas for a fifth and sixth. With Patricia, his wife of 68 years ever by his side, he tells of his time in the U.S. Navy transporting soldiers to and from the frontlines in World War II, in both the Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans. He also served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War, and in the U.S. Navy Reserves in between.

Archie John Dailey was born in Georgia, and met his bride in Birmingham, Alabama. Then A.J. and Patricia had four sons and travelled from Germany, and across the southern United States from Alabama, Texas, Florida, Mississippi, and back to Texas to stay. Most of the Daileys' sons



and their kids and grandkids live nearby, which is nice for keeping their large family together. When asked words of wisdom or advice on a happy, long life, he says he'll wait a few years to share his insight, "When I get to be 100, I'll tell you!"

Dailey's pretty sure he was the one captured on camera kissing a nurse he grabbed at the V-J Day parade and celebration in New York—you know that famous picture we've all seen... but it could've been that other guy that came forward, too—he'll let him have it. This time, he was undoubtedly the star of the parade as the Grand Marshal, leading the whole procession through Downtown Rockwall.

The City of Rockwall Parks and Recreation Department has designed and installed a new landscape educational garden on the grounds at City Hall. Among the many attributes, this garden exhibit has state of the art high performance micro-rotor irrigation for water conservation efforts.

This exhibit also displays multiple examples of Smart-Scape and Earth-Kind landscaping plants, in addition to multiple examples of hardscapes. Due to water conservation efforts in recent years, Texans have been asked to be



more mindful of what they plant. The hope is that more residents will choose grasses and plants that need less water.

The City Hall garden is an example of landscape that utilizes very little water. It features perennials, annuals, shrubs and ornamental trees that traditionally perform well in the North Texas area with little disease and insect pressure.

Plan to Recycle Your Live Christmas Tree

If you're one of the tree purists who love to have a live Christmas tree to brighten your home, we have some information you may want to hear. Once the Christmas season comes to a close and you're ready to toss your live tree, please do so responsibly. The City of Rockwall has a program to recycle trees and use the mulch in public parks. Tree drop-off begins Tuesday, December 26, and runs through Monday, January 8. Be sure to remove all lights, ornaments and stands, and take your tree to the Tuttle Sports Complex parking lot located at 1600 Airport Road.
