

Discovery Statue Unveiled in Historic Downtown Rockwall

Crowds gathered recently to celebrate the unveiling of the new Discovery Statue in Downtown Rockwall.

The sculpture honors the three pioneers, Terry Utley Wade, Benjamin Boydstun, and William Clay Stevenson, who dug a well in 1852 and found the rock wall that runs under the entire city. The men had no idea at the time the significance of their finding, especially that the City of Rockwall would be platted two years later in honor of their discovery.

The Discovery Project has been nearly 20 years in the making, starting with local artist Jim Bryant who created an original smaller version that was the model for the full-size project. He donated his time and talents directing the project's completion. The statues themselves are about 150% scale, standing at roughly 9' each and they are located at the southeast corner of the Historic County Courthouse on the square.





Rockwall Dedicates U.S. Flag

Rockwall has dedicated the larger-than-life patriotic welcome for all who enter the city. The city installed the U.S. flag on I-30 last fall, and the ceremony was originally set for Veteran's Day weekend, but it was rained out. The 50x80' flag weighs about 120lbs and sits atop a 190' flagpole. It has been the source of pride and a lot of buzz for the city, including Mayor Kevin Fowler being interviewed live on Fox News. Love Your Landscape... Saving a Precious Natural Resource

Automatic irrigation systems are one of the best inventions out there, but they are frankly only as good as the person operating them. There is a big misconception that you simply, "set it and forget it," but that can leave a precious resource literally going down the drain!

Most systems run only at night and are never actually seen in operation. That's why you should turn on your system once per week and run through the zones to identify any leaks, broken heads that may malfunction only when the system is in operation. Any leakage can result in high water bills, dead landscape and lawn, run-off, and wasted water.

Remember, most irrigation zones should have different runtimes based on sun/shade, slopes, soil type and plant types. The goal is to apply one-inch of water per week and this includes rain, so if it rains, skip watering that week. Here is a sample for programming your irrigation system:

Tuesday and Friday Watering

- Start time 4:00 a.m. (best watering window is between 4-10 a.m.)
- Spray zones between 5-20 minutes, based on conditions, plants & nozzle precipitation rate
- Rotor zones between 15-40 minutes, based on conditions, plants & nozzle precipitation rate
